What Have You Been Up To?

Oddities Tour of Baldwin County - June 25

We met on the Causeway in Mobile for a tour hosted by the Back Roads Touring Region. We took Big Red out for the day, the Barnett's 61 Cadillac. She needs to stretch her legs too. It felt appropriate to drive the live oak covered Government Street to the Bankhead tunnel that was built in 1941. .

10 cars started the tour with 16 people participating in the tour. On the trip through Spanish Fort, we saw a giant yellow ribbon, 18 ft dental tools and a 16 ft tall paper clip before stopping at Alligator Alley. Our leaders, Rod and Karen Matthews missed one of the first turns in the directions, so we gladly gave a neighborhood a parade as their GPS got us back on track. A few of us stopped and saw the large alligators along the Alligator Alley boardwalk.

Our first stop was at the United States Sports Academy, where we saw athletes made of junk created by Ben Larsen. We hung out under the big oak trees to wait for everyone to catch up. There are ten sculptures on permanent display on the grounds.

On our way to our next stop, we saw a few oddities on the side of the road. The copper fist holding the American flag and "Frank" and "Stein" made from old car parts. The Hermit Hut of Tolstoy Park was fascinating. In 1920, Henry Stuart of Nampa, Idaho was diagnosed with tuberculosis and was told he

would live a year. He packed up and moved to Fairhope, Alabama to live alone in the woods. He built a naturally air-conditioned hut half underground and lived for 29 more years.

On our way to our next stop, we saw some unique bottle trees and had the pleasure of traveling the back roads covered by the giant southern live oaks that span the entire roadway.

Our next stop was at Fairhope's Fairytale Castles. These magical, one-of-a-kind handcrafted treasures were created over more than sixty years, beginning with Sheldon's Castle, once the home of the legendary artist and sculptor, Craig Sheldon. They are fascinating from the outside. But luck was on our side, and we were invited inside to tour the castles by the owner. Our guide, Dean Mosher, explained to us about the history of the family that built the castles. We also had the pleasure of seeing Mosher's latest paintings. Three generations of artists have contributed to the creation of the Castles.

With temperatures reaching the 90s and relative humidity of 90% we were all ready for some AC at the Waterfront! The day was awesome with a lot of interesting sights! Our Leaders, Karen and Rod, presented the history of all the stops and made the trip very interesting. - Charlotte Dahlenburg

Day Four gave us a free morning to wander around London before driving to the Plunkett Estate to view a private collection of over 90 cars. 
In the wish for relaxing summer vacations, here are a few apps that we at Apple Tool Box love to use during our family trips.

So let's get to

Road Trip Bingo

This game is easy to play and can involve everyone in the family during a road trip. While the kids play the game in

the back seats, you or your co-pilot follow along from the passenger seat using your iPhone. The game comes with nine different game boards. The basic board game from the app's offering provides an assortment of bingo tiles of commonly seen scenery on the trip such as cars, animals, signs and the countryside.





is the license plate game board. The board lets you use all state plates, or you can select a setting and limit the choices to a particular state or region where you are traveling to/from. The basic app is free and ad-supported. Road Trip Bingo is a fun, interactive game and it's saved us Apple Tool Box adults a lot of road trip frustration.

Classic Mad Libs

Who can resist this one? Not me. It's the game I played countless times on road trips with my family in the preiDevice era (or dawn of time according to our young

ones.) Mad Libs never gets old and weary. With more than 500 plus reviews of 4+ rating, this one is well worth checking out for all your family trips. Mad Libs brings out the creative and silly side of our youngest and oldest-and that includes





Grandpa too. Everyone can create hilarious stories just by adding a verb.

One nice feature that we appreciate in Mad Libs is the built-in kid-friendly user interface. Kids have a lot of fun and at the same time (unbeknownst to them) get to learn smart word choices while they are using the app. Mad Libs is both kid and grandparent approved as "really cool, " and the basic version is free! Additional content is priced at USD \$1.99, including the brand new "Diary of a Wimpy Kid."

Drawing Desk

If your young ones are into coloring books, they will not be bored with Drawing Desk. With more than 6 million users,

this app has something for everybody. The built in kids desk provides an opportunity for kids to have all types of fun with drawing. They can draw with music and magic



wands (and what kid doesn't love magic wands).

If you are using the iPad Pro models, the app is optimized for the best drawing experience. So the next time you hit the road (or the air) with your young artist, download this app and let the creativity begin. The basic version is free with upgrades available as needed.

500 Coloring Pages

If your kids prefer coloring to drawing you, hen this



coloring 500 pages app is for you and your youngster(s). This app is specifically designed for kids ages 6 - 8 and supports a bunch of categories including fast

cars, fairies, animals and of course our Apple Tool Box Kids beloved dinosaurs! There are three difficulty levels, easy, medium and hard—these are sure to keep the kids challenged for hours. The Lite version is free and you purchase upgrades as wanted (or needed.)

4 Pics 1 Word

This is one of my favorites because it's particularly fun for grown-ups like me that like to get silly and playful and (sometimes) act as kids while traveling. Four Pics One Word is a very simple yet really addictive game that





shows you four pictures. You (okay...or your kids) have to come up with a word that is the common thread running throughout all the pictures. This puzzle is fun to play and there are tons of puzzles

from easy ones to pretty hard ones.

You can play all by yourself or pass the device around so everyone is included. We've found on our trips that playing 4 Pics 1 Word is a great way to pass time quickly. Please note that the rating on this is for ages 12 and up but we find that Four Pics One Word is enjoyed by all ages from young to old. The basic version is free.

Summary

Who doesn't love summer vacation? The idea of getting away from it all and enjoying some down time with our family is one of the things that keeps us going throughout the year. Family trips are meant to be fun, a break from all that stress. But a long car ride or an unexpected delay at the airport can very quickly change that harmony into absolute misery. 

A look back at the history of the future of cars

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The Chrysler "Solar Sedan"

From the minute the first Ford Model Ts rolled off the assembly lines, our oil-dependent future was sealed. However, a few smart-thinking visionaries one day realized that, instead of looking below for our insatiable fuel fix, it might be worth looking above—to the most plentiful source of energy we know. The sun, it was theorized, could one day be used to power everything form our homes to our vehicles, and futurists were giddy with optimism.

In fact, it wasn't uncommon to find manufacturers like Chrysler musing on the possibility of a solar-powered future. In 1958, then-Chrysler vice-president James C. Zeder predicted that, as the efficiency of solar panels increased, it could be possible to harness that energy for use in so-called "solar sedans." And in 1987 that's exactly what GM did, producing one of the most impressive solarpowered racecars to date—the Sunraycer.

Of course, the idealistic "solar sedan" envisioned by Chrysler over 50 years ago is still a long ways off—and even today, solar-powered vehicles require custom engines and aerodynamic designs just to function reliably. Still, it's not bad progress for what was once just a pipe dream in the minds of futurists and automotive VPs.

The Jetsons' Aerocar

There really was no greater influence on our visions of the future of driving than that portrayed by The



Jetsons in the early '60s. This was a family that was the very definition of futuristic living, in everything from the artificially intelligent robot maid to the holographic bigscreen television—and their car was no exception.

We're not given a huge amount of insight into how the family's vehicle functions, other than that it flies. In fact, the so-called "car" is more akin to a flying saucer than a traditional vehicle, with a large, bubble-top enclosure and decidedly space-age design. Inexplicably, it can even collapse to the size of a briefcase—apparently solving any futuristic parking concerns—which George Jetson then often carries into work.

However, it's probably best not to read too deeply into a cartoon primarily aimed at entertaining children and their families. Hanna-Barbera's vision of the future was so caught-up in the technological optimism of the time that most of its predictions are either extremely outlandish or plain impractical. However, The Jetsons got one thing right—traffic will never, ever go away, even when our cars can fly.

The Speeders of Star Wars



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For a series that's decades old, it's no surprise that Star Wars is mired in more lore and history than even the most dedicated fan can wrap his or her head around—and that's excluding the expanded universe, too. However, as much as Star Wars is about Jedis, Sith, and the joys of Sarlaac pits, there's a whole lot of impressive technology involved here too.

That includes cars—flying ones, to be exact. But just like the vehicles of today, there are a bevy of different models. Landspeeders, which we're introduced in the very first film (or fourth, if that's your thing), are more hovercraft than car, while airspeeders are capable of proper flight at much higher altitudes and speeds. And though not mentioned in the films, the expanded universe explains that each speeder is actually powered by a series of repulsors which push against gravity to achieve lift.

Both vehicles' configurations figure prominently

throughout the series, though it's not until the prequel trilogy—thanks to the wonders of CGI—that we get to experience a bustling metropolis filled with speeders firsthand.

Blade Runner's Spinner





It's hard to compile a list of futuristic vehicles without giving a nod to Blade Runner—one of the most influential science fiction films to date. Designer and concept artist Syd Mead was tasked with designing the film's iconic flying vehicles, known as Spinners, which are pictured throughout much of the film. A total of 25 vehicles were built by custom carmaker Gene Winfield, some of which still exist today.

Each Spinner could be driven like a traditional vehicle, but was also capable of airborne operation, thanks to a vertical propulsion system. However, the vehicles' use was limited primary to the police and other specially authorized personal. In fact, it's revealed that Spinners were only meant to augment the current population of vehicles, and not completely replace the traditional, roadbound car.

Though created in an era before CGI was commonplace, seeing Blade Runner's Spinners in action is nothing short of breathtaking, even today. These are vehicles that look as if they could be real—and in Ridley Scott's futuristic dystopia, that makes each Spinner as much a character as any other in the film.
